The Registered Herbalist, RH(AHG), credential offered through the American Herbalists Guild is an acclaimed and widely recognized credential that may be acquired through 1200+ hours of study in a variety of aspects of Herbal Medicine. The RH(AHG) designation is currently the only widely recognized committee-reviewed credential available to herbalists in the US.

USING YOUR CREDENTIALS


What is the preferred order of credentials? The standard preferred order is:

- Highest earned degree
- National Licensure
- State designations or requirements
- Professional credentials

You can make a good impression by using your credentials properly—on your resume, business card, online profiles, in your signature, or other online and print needs.

Using the proper format is a good way to show pride in your profession and avoid confusion among holistic practitioners.

We recommend that you use the guide below to consistently feature your RH(AHG) credential.



HOW TO LIST YOUR CREDENTIALS

After your name, include a comma, and the initials RH(AHG), without any initials or space between the initials and parentheses. You can spell this out as Registered Herbalist(AHG).

Most people list their credentials in the order in which they earned them. Be sure to include the (AHG) with the RH credential to acknowledge that it is the Registered Herbalist credential under the American Herbalists Guild.

FOLLOW THESE EXAMPLES

Janet Smith, RH(AHG)
Janet Smith, MS, LAc, RH(AHG)
Or Janet Smith, LAc, RMT, RH(AHG)

If you have credentials as a medical herbalist in the UK, a registered herbalist in Canada, and Registered Herbalist(AHG) in the US, list them in the order of the licensure.

For Example:

Janet Smith, RN, MNIMH, Registered Herbalist, RH(AHG), SEP

You can spell out Registered Herbalist(AHG), if followed by (AHG) before the comma: Janet Smith, MNIMH, Registered Herbalist, Registered Herbalist(AHG)

Registered Herbalists, RH(AHG), are increasingly recognized by the wider healthcare community at large. As the widespread reach of herbal medicine expands, the RH(AHG) credential is increasingly relevant in many diverse fields of medicine. By recommending consistent language, we support a professional image of RH(AHG).

WHAT ABOUT...

Here are a few examples of the incorrect way to use the credential:

Registered Herbalist through AHG
(RH) American Herbal Guild
AHG Registered Herbalist
Registered Medical Herbalist AHG
Registered Medical Herbalist, MNIMH, CHA, AHG
RH American Herbalist Guild

HOW TO LIST YOUR CREDENTIALS WITH THE LOGO

You can use the Registered Herbalist Member logo on your social media, signature, and website. As a standalone logo, you can place it as it is.

As a signature in your email, use below your name and credentials listing. On your website you can use as a footer or on your credentials/about page. Please do not edit or change the logo.
